#### What are the main principles associated with the rule of law?

It is generally agreed that five principles are vital to the operation of the rule of law:

| Fairness       | The rule of law means the law should apply to everyone,  |

| Rationality    | Laws must be able to be  |
| Predictability | Certainty about what the law is, and the outcome for it.   |
| Consistency    | Knowing that the law is being applied to all in the same way.                                      |
| Impartiality   | That there is an impartial free from influence by the other arms of government or external forces. |

## Where did the rule of law originate?

The concepts we associate with the rule of law can be traced back to the Magna \_\_\_\_\_\_(1225), which stated that no person could punished except under the \_\_\_\_\_\_. They also can be found in Greek philosopher Aristotle's *Ideas for Good Governance*. The term 'rule of law' can be traced back to the British Professor of English at Oxford University, AV Dicey in 1885.
