John Basson Humffray arrived on the Victorian goldfields in 1853, from Wales



Humffray was a leading member of **The Ballarat Reform League,** formed in October 1853

Humffray was the negotiator, a peaceful man who did not want change to occur through violence

The Ballarat Reform League Charter of Rights was written by Humffray. The aims of the League included law reform in the administration of the goldfields, and revised laws relating to access and use of Crown Land

Humffray was the Minister for Mines 1860 - 1861, representing the interests of the diggers in the seat of North Grant

Humffray went into hiding after government troops stormed the stockade at Eureka, 3 December 1854

In 1863, Humffray became
Chairman of the Royal
Commission on Mining, improving
law and order on the goldfields

Humffray became an elected member of the Victorian Legislative Assembly for Ballarat East between 1856 – 1864 and 1868 – 1871

Humffray introduced legislation on Civic development, Goldfields administration, Land surveying, and Mining on private property
